FIGURATIVE SPEECH IN CALUM SCOTT'S SONG "YOU ARE THE REASON"

Abstract: Figure of speech is an expression used for literacy needs both verbally and in writing. This study aims to identify the types of figurative speech and analyze the meaning of figurative speech found in the song lyric "You Are The Reason" by Calum Scott. This research uses descriptive-qualitative research approach. The research data are taken from Calum Scott's song You Are The Reason. The analysis used Kennedy's figurative speech theory. From the analysis of the song lyrics, the researcher identified 5 types of figurative speech with total of 8 data and meaning. The types of figurative speech are metaphor 2 data, similes 2 data, personification 1 data, hyperbole 1 data, and symbolism 2 data. The most dominant figurative speech found in this study are metaphor, similes, and symbolism. In conclusion, Calum Scott's "You Are the Reason" stands out for its effective use of figurative speech to convey deep emotional experiences. By applying Kennedy's figurative speech theory, we could learn how Scott's song transforms into a powerful narrative that deeply resonates with listeners, illustrating the enduring and universal nature of love.

INTRODUCTION

Emanuel (1842) A figure of speech, or rhetorical figure, is a word or phrase that intentionally deviates from ordinary language use to produce a rhetorical effect. Figures of speech are commonly divided into two categories: schemes, which alter the normal arrangement of words, and tropes, which involve using words in a way that conveys a meaning different from their usual definition. Perrine (1974) figurative speech as an essential literary tool that not only decorates language but also deepens meaning, evokes emotion, and sharpens understanding. For him, the use of figurative language is central to how poetry (and by extension, all literature) communicates complex human experiences.

Figures of speech in song lyrics can be varied and complex, depending on the listener's point of view and experience. They enhance the beauty of language and are commonly used in various literary forms like songs and poetry. Types include personification, hyperbole, metaphor, assonance, and idiom. Authors use these to make lyrics more engaging and expressive, both in spoken and written forms.

Calum Scott's emotional delivery and personal storytelling in his music challenge listeners, making his experiences relatable through his songwriting. His mix of pop and soft rock has solidified his standing in the music industry. Language is crucial for human interaction, serving social and emotional needs. Literature can be presented in various forms, including songs, and understanding song lyrics helps in grasping their meaning and purpose. The use of figurative language in "You Are The Reason" aids in understanding the deeper message and emotions intended by the singer. This research focuses on examining the figurative language and meanings in the song.

Learning to understand figurative speech in songs is important for expressing deeper meanings. Figurative language allows poets to communicate indirectly, making their work more engaging. The purpose of figurative speech is to convey meaning while creating an aesthetic experience in writing and music. Songs often contain moral messages wrapped in beautifully crafted lyrics with profound meanings. By analyzing figurative speech in lyrics, we can grasp what the song's creator intends to express, enhancing our understanding of ourselves and the world through music. The researcher will focus on the figurative speech in Calum Scott's song "You Are The Reason."

The researcher is interested in this study because analyzing song lyrics helps uncover the hidden meanings within them. "You Are The Reason" was chosen due to common challenges in understanding its figurative speech. The research questions include identifying the types of figurative speech in "You Are The Reason" and determining their meanings. The study aims to identify and analyze the figurative speech in the song's lyrics. The focus will be specifically on "You Are The Reason" by Calum Scott. The researcher hopes the findings will enhance understanding of figurative speech among English Literature students and aid future research in this area.

RESEARCH METHOD

According to Moleong (2019:6), qualitative research produces descriptive data in the form of written or spoken words from the subjects being observed. The researcher identified 2 metaphors, 2 similes, 1 personification, 1 hyperbole, and 2 instances of symbolism. Drawing Conclusions – Summarizing findings clearly and ensuring they align with the research objectives are discussed below.

In this passage, the researcher analyzes the lyrics using the both listening and reading methods in order to concise and identify specific sentences from the song You Are The Reason for analyzes metaphor, similes, personification, hyperbole and symbolism.
