The reason of Phileas Fogg is a generous person that shown in the novel Around the World in 80 Days, because he saved Aouda from death by the Sutee ceremony in India. Sutee or Sati is the act of immolating a woman after her husband's death. It happened during Fogg's travel to around the world in 80 days.

Phileas Fogg or Mr. Fogg introduced as a wealth Englishman, an eccentric human who had less intention with attractions. He is the member of Reform Club and knows the 'world' better.

Then one of Fogg friend dares him to a challenge that to around the world in 80 days. Fogg insists that he can do it and declares that as shown on quotation below:

"A true Englishman doesn't joke when he is talking about so serious thing as a wager', replied Fogg, solemnly."(20)

After that conversation, Fogg decides to start it with his servant and finish it on 21st december with the agreement from the six men as the proof for the challenge.

They took themselves the first class seatson train and their journey just begin. Then, they arrived at Suez via the steamer Mongolia on Wednesday, 9th of October. They got a catch up with Fix, one of the detectives from Reform Club. Fix follow up Fogg and Passepartout because they look suspicious for him. He tries to separate Passepartout from Fogg and make them lose the steamer.

When arrived to Kholby, the train stops because the railway isn't finished. The conductor suggests the passengers to fins any other transportation to go on, but Fogg still think positively as quoted below:

"Mr. Fogg, this is a delay greatly to your disadvantage."

'No, Sir Francis; it was foreseen.'

'What! You knew that the way-'

'Not at all; but I knew that some obstacle or other would sooner or later arise on my route."(67)

Fogg sacrifices two days to reach the steamer, he sure that they will be on time. Then, they found the solution, a war-like elephant named Kiouni. Fogg wants to hire the elephant but the owner declined it. To make it fast, he buys that elephant with a great amount of money. The guide Parsee offers shortcut way.

On his journey, surely difficulties would appears. Fogg risks his money even his life. He suggests to wait until night to do the rescue.

"Her name was Aouda. Left an orphan, she was married against her will to the old Rajah of Bundelcund, and knowing the fate that awaited her, she escaped, was retaken and devoted by Rajah's relatives, who had an interest in her death, to sacrifice from which it seemed she could not escape."(82)

They make a plan for escaping the woman and it is a great success. After a great counters with the fellow, they got the woman who still remain unconscious because the effect of Opium. Sir Francis said that Aouda will fall again to their hand if still remains in India and the same procession can be held again. She would be safe by quitting India.

Aouda say thanks to all of the things that happened on her, the people who rescue her life. She thanked Fogg, because without him the plan won't be happen. Fogg offers her to join them in their journey and escort her to Hong Kong, where she might be remain safely from her pursuers. Not for a long time, the caught by the police, looking for Aouda. She told to Fogg to leave her facing her fate, and won't let bad things happen on them just because of her.

Fix saw them and followed them again, still thinks that Fogg is the robber that held sum of money and able to pay for the bail just for his servant. Fogg has spent more than five thousand pounds on the way.

"After all, she owed Phileas Fogg her life, and she always regarded him through the exalting medium of her gratitude." (68)

The weather go bad continues to put the Rangoon behind schedule and the passengers became impatient. The steamer go slower, the captain estimates Hong Kong would be reach twenty hours behind the estimated time. Fogg act as though he already foreseen the delay. Passepartout panics by the arrival will be held. The steamer which crossed the Pacific from Yokohama to San Francisco make a direct connection with that from Hong Kong, and if Fogg's group late, the will miss it.

On landing, after Aouda looking for what she needed, she looks for her cousin, Jeejeeh but they get a news that her cousin had left China for two years ago and retired from being Parsee merchant. Aouda got silenced for a moment and ask Fogg:

"What I ought to do, Mr. Fogg?"

'It is very simple, responded the gentleman. 'Go to Europe'

'But I can not intrude-'

'You do not intrude, nor do you in the least embarrass my project. Passepartout!"(128)

Passepartout manages to board the carnatic although he still in opium's effect. He goes looking for his master but can't find him or even Aouda. He starts to feel angry because Fix makes him like this. Passepartout then reach Yokohama and talk to himself as shown on below quotation:

"It is evident,' said him to himself, that I have been abominably drunk! What will Mr. Fogg say? At least I have not missed the steamer, which is the most important thing."(156)

When he saw his mater in the audiences, he moves away and the pyramid collapses. Honorable Batulcar gets furious but silenced by Fogg who throws a handful of banknotes to him. Fogg, Aouda, and Passepartout got reunited again. Aouda tells Passepartout about everything that happen when he is away. Fogg hears all Passepartout story and start the sailing from Yokohama to San Francisco.

The weather and snow begin irritating Passepartout as he grows impatient for the part of their journey to be over. Aouda just recognized that Colonel Proctor is on their train, she worries that Phileas will do his promise. Fogg is becoming dearer to Aouda as shown on following quotation:

"She was attached to the man who, however coldly gave her daily evidences of the most absolute devotion. She did not comprehend, perhaps, the depth of the sentiment with which her protector inspired her, which he called gratitude, but which, through she was unconscious of it, was really more than that. Her heart sank

within her when she recognized the man whom Mr. Fogg desired, sooner or later, to call to account for his conduct."(207)

Aouda tells Fix and Passepartout about Proctor's presence in train and agrees to not let Fogg sees him. Eventually the train slowed down because of the old suspension and the driver not going to proceed ahead (Moonik, Mogea & Sabudu, 2020). There is a debate between the personnel and passengers about what should to do. They agrees to put the train at full speed to get over the bridge. Luckily, nothing happens to the train and everybody able to cross the bridge. After that, the bridge collapses and crashes into the rapids of Medicine Bow.

Passepartout feels guilty because all of this happens because of his fault, but detective Fix suggests a new plan as shown on quotation below:

"You must regain eight hours. Do you wish to try to do so?"

'On foot? Asked Mr. Fogg'

'No; on a sledge,' replied Fix. 'On a sledge with sails. A man has proposed such a method to me."(235)

Fix agrees with it, but Aouda should stay with Passepartout, then blocked by Aouda because she wants to be brave girl and stay with Fogg. Fogg and the group grab a train to Chicago, then to New York only to find that the ship bound for Liverpool has already left.

Now, Fogg and his group are broke, the deadline for the bet has passed and there is nothing to do but to go home. Fogg locks himself in his room in seriously depressed. Aouda and Passepartout are worried for him too. Passepartout stand by himself outside the door to take actions if his master decides to do suicide. Aouda sits down and talk with Fogg. He tells that can't provide anything more because he's broke now but Aouda tells him that she don't need any money, she wants Fogg and marry her as shown on below quotation:

"I pity you, then, Mr Fogg, for solitude is a sad thing, with no heart to which to confide your griefs. They say, though, that misery itself, shared by two sympathetic souls, may be borne with patience.'

'They say so, madam.'

'Mr. Fogg,' said Aouda, rising and seizing his hand, 'do you wish at once a kinswoman and friend? Will you have me for your wife?"(268)

By travelling eastward around the world, Fogg has forgotten the time he arrived is two days earlier. Passepartout races home, grab Fogg and go to the club and win the bet. He is rich once more, but more important of that, he has won the heart of a 'charming woman' as quoted below:

"But if I had not crossed India, I should not have saved Aouda; she would not have been my wife, and-"(279)

From the statement above, if Phileas Fogg not join the Reform Club and accept the challenge, he won't be able to around the world and find his biggest happiness, to marry Aouda and make her to be his wife.

Phileas Fogg is rich enough, he could buy anything he wanted to. In his journey, he willingly to do everything just because he is in hurry to finish it in 80 days. From the beginning of his journey he spare his money to a woman beggar as quoted below:

After saving that woman then their journey continues. Aouda thank to Fogg that without him maybe she won't be alive, he is her saviour and day by day she falls in love and marry Fogg:
