This research has a purpose to analyze the superiority of Tris in Veronica Roth's Divergent. Divergent is about the story of divided society into five categories according to their priority of choices in life called factions, they are "Abnegation" for selflessness, "Candor" for honesty, "Erudite" for knowledge, "Amity" for peacefulness or compassion, and "Dauntless" for bravery. The system of dividing society into five factions in the novel is called the "Faction System" (Lolowang, 2010). The society believes that the "Faction System" has purposed to protect people from the disarray of the world (Potu et al, 2021). In Divergent, there is some kind of domination between two factions over other five factions which are "Abnegation" and "Erudite". "Abnegation" has their selflessness to care each other even factionles, while "Erudite" has their knowledge to make a development on the "Faction System". This kind of domination is known as hegemony; According to the Routledge Dictionary of Literary Terms stated about the definition of hegemony, "it has come to mean power exercised by creating the belief in the majority

of people in a society that power is the prerogative of a group or class as a 'natural' or otherwise justified right" (Childs and Fowler, 1973: 102).

Superiority is being superior, this attitude can be seen in the character of Beatrice prior, the main character in Divergent novel. Because of this attitude, Beatrice played an important role in saving the Abnegation from massacre. Being superior means suppressing feelings of inferiority to be more confident in doing social things and making choices in life. The reflection of Superiority of Tris

Veronica Roth's main idea in the novel is also supported by her own style in which the story is told she tells the story using simple metaphors to be able to. Tris, by nature, is not limited to displaying only one of the

Divergent traits. The five characteristics Tris has been shown to have a strong personality since a young age. A mix of curiosity and selfishness, traits that clearly do not mix sense of abnegation Her Divergence enables her brain to act with traits from three of the five factions, as authenticated by her. Aptitude Tests revealed that she was equally suited for Abnegation.

Erudite and fearless. Tris is a Divergent character. Her fictitious finalism appears following the aptitude test. In this case, Tris's result cannot be inconclusive. Normally, people have only one outcome, but Tris has three. They are Erudite, Fearless, and Submissive. Divergent is the name given in this case (Roth's, 47). Divergent people, according to Erudite, are extremely dangerous, so Tris must conceal her Divergent status. It perplexes her because her instructor does not explain why Divergent is dangerous. So Tris' goal is to discover her personal identity through Divergent.

Tris's desire for superiority manifests itself in her attempt to become the first Dauntless member. It is difficult because she is the weakest of the initiates. Eric stated that only ten people will be able to participate. Tris's inferiority complex manifests itself when she faces difficulties in becoming a Dauntless member. It causes her to become more progressive.

Through her efforts to protect her Divergent identity and discover the reason Divergent is dangerous on the other hand, she tries to demonstrate that She can beat the other initiates and take first place in the final initiate stage because she is divergent, with the traits Erudite, Abnegation, and Dauntless. It makes her smart, brave, and desire to protect her friends and family Tris's social interest when she has a large number of friends. To do so, overcome the causes of her inferiority in order to achieve her She requires the cooperation of others to achieve her ultimate goal. She has acquaintances.

Tris's way of life makes her a hero to her friends. She is always helpful to her. I never betrayed my friends. She is a brave and kind girl. She is never late. She is afraid to defend her friends and family. She is able to do so because she is Divergent, has the Abnegation trait, is brave from Dauntless, and is clever. From the Erudite when Tris receives a lot of help from her family, her creative power shines through. and friends to discover why she was labeled dangerous by Divergent. Divergent is risky because they cannot be controlled by a computer System. It will cause problems for Erudite, whose goal is to be destroyed. The government is then handled by abnegation. When the Erudite plan failed, she is going to save place for a while and then create a new one.

Being Better To Be Brave

Beatrice Prior, also known as Tris who, investigates her identity within a society that defines its citizens based on their social and personality affiliations with five distinct factions.

It will require a great act of selfishness to choose Abnegation or a great act of courage to choose Dauntless, and maybe just choosing one over the other will prove that I belong. Tomorrow, those two qualities will struggle within me, and only one can win (Roth's, 37)

Based on the statement above, it explains that Beatrice shows her bravery with her statement about stay with her family or following her passion. She knows when she picks one of them she will get the big decision and realize how brave she is. According to Peter Lehman's masculinity concept, bravery or courage is an ability to fight the fear from danger, illness, and other awkward feelings and circumstances. Beatrice shows her bravery because she fights her fear to choose Dauntless and leave her parents. At the point when Beatrice picks the Dauntless as her new group, individuals figure she can't through it. At the point when she and all-new individuals from the Dauntless group go to the Dauntless

spot, they see some enormous opening in the center between two structures. Those assertions demonstrate that Beatrice shows her boldness. "I thought about the motto I read in my Faction History textbook: Faction before blood. More than just family, our faction is where we come from. Could that be true?"(Roth's, 43). From the earliest starting point, Tris and her sibling were different, a few things, for example, being worried about others didn't show up as a part of her character, this made Tris keep thinking about whether she didn't have a major heart like her folks and more seasoned kin. Eventually, Tris understood that she didn't care for brutality, it appeared to be that she needed equity, and she demanded getting it going. This made her challenge to take the important choice to leave Abnegation and pick the Dauntless faction. She left her folks in Abnegation and don't have a clue what might befall them. I think he found a way to set me on fire, to punish me for what I did, but no — I'm going to cry|| (page 48). —I turned my head to find Caleb in the crowd of Erudite behind me. He was standing among the other initiates, shaking hands with the transfer faction, a young boy who was Candor... My stomach hurt and I turned around. If it is easy for him, maybe it is easy for me too (Roth's 49)

The fearlessness was standing out to the surface as though pushed and promptly came out. Henceforth, mental fortitude is appeared through her solidarity to shield her choice, regardless of whether it harms. At the point when she and her family are destroyed by her choice to pick another group. Courage is likewise found in each time Tris chooses something, she will persevere through and discover an exit plan for it. Tris' courage isn't

just observed at quite a significant second, yet it has a solid establishment from her mom's nurturing style, and a portion of her encounters that shape this side of mental fortitude. Since a significant number of her Abnegation is denial that solitary thinks about others and never set up a battle when others hurt, cause her to think and to feel bothered. Since this occurs, again and again, it makes her courageous side considerably more shaped and comes out at the opportune time. So that in his decision of life he had the option to choose Dauntless and even left her family to pick a group that was altogether different from her family. When Tris joined the Dauntless group, she needed to show the fortitude to the individual individuals from her new group. Tris and Christina need to hop from a train that never stops into a structure. As the train runs eight stories over the ground, Tris and her new companion, Christina, need to bounce into a structure that has a two-meter hop before landing. "The idea of jumping out of a running train onto the roof, knowing there was a gap between the edge of the roof and the edge of the tracks, made me want to vomit" (Roth's, 53). This gives another illustration of bravery where Tris must substantiate herself bravely to her group of individuals. There is a lot of proof that must be shown to some friends and also her family that even though she is from the faction who has to give in every time to other people, she can also show courage and potential in every test she goes through. She must continue to hold back when in pain, and carry out tasks even though she failed. As long as they have a goal, everyone will always survive in any condition.

One of them shot him in the stomach, and he was moaning so hard I could almost feel it against my chest. He clutched his stomach, his shoulders hit the wall... Blood spilled on his hands and his face faded... My eyes burned and I was too weak to get up; the smell of sweat and blood made me nauseous... But what I said to my father was true — for every second I wasted, another Abnegation member died... I pushed myself up and ran down the

hall, turning right at the end. There is only one door at the front. I opened it (Roth's, 471-472).

From this, we can see how Tris put her melancholy and distress aside to take recollect her parent's trust in her in finding bravery in herself. She likewise concedes that she needs to put others' carries on with first before her stun and trouble. Tris has an extremely solid heart that she should keep on completing her central goal even though she sees the family she cherishes lying vulnerable. (Roth's , 86) Her enthusiasm and character suddenly come out and Tris begins to feel like a fully fledged member of the Dauntless. During a competitive initiation, Beatrice renames herself Tris as a sign of beginning of a new life. "'Tris,'" I say firmly." (Roth's 87) "A new place, a new name. I can be remade here." (Roth's ,88) She feels free when living with the Dauntless. In contrast to her present life, in her old faction she was not herself, she had to pretend she was "someone else". She is sure about her decision without any hesitation. "If my entire life is like this, loud laughter and bold action and the kind of exhaustion you feel after a hard but satisfying day, I will be content." (Roth's, 89) Prior to her final decision, Tris also considered other factions where she could transfer to but her preference was still the Dauntless. "I always knew I couldn't be Candor. I mean, I try to be honest, but some things you just don't want people to know. Plus, I like to be in control of my own mind." (Roth's ,90) Tris is conscious that her stay in the Dauntless faction will not be easy, but she is

willing to accept it because she is sure she will be there. "I am proud. It will get me into trouble someday, but today it makes me brave." (Roth's, 91) As mentioned previously, in her previous faction she did not feel to be herself and could not develop as she would like to. She was unable to conform to all the rules and did not want to be controlled. "At home, I could never do what I wanted, not even for an evening. I had to think of other people's needs first. I don't even know what I like to do." (Roth's, 92) After her change of factions she manifests what she had to conceal in Abnegation. She is more self-confident, determined but also audacious and is able to defend her opinions. "What makes you think I want to go home?" I ask, my cheeks hot. "You think I can't handle this or something?" "This is what I chose. This is it." (Roth's, 93) "I'm brave," I say, staring into her eyes. The other factions see the Dauntless a certain way. Brash, aggressive, impulsive. Cocky. I should be what she expects. I smirk at her. "I'm the best initiate they've got." (Roth's, 94)

Which, as I recall, is a sign of cowardice. Then it should be easy for you, Eric says. If you're willing to take his place.|| The last thing I want to do is stand in front of that target, but I can't back down now. I didn't leave myself the option. I weave through the crowd of initiates, and someone shoves my shoulder. (Roth's, 69)

The Beatrice heroic character is increasingly triggered to overflow during training, Eric told Al to stand on the target board. According to the statement above, Because Al could not match the knife on the target board, Eric intended to teach that dauntless never gave up. Al looks exceptionally reluctant to remain before the objective board, and Four will toss a blade at Al at Eric's request. Beatrice is saved by her mother from the influence of serum given by Jeanine, but her mother must die while saving Beatrice. Then, Beatrice went to her father and brother's hiding place. Greater and Skillful make Her equal to man

The first thing you will learn is how to shoot a gun. The second thing is how to win a fight.|| Four presses a gun into my palm without looking at me and keeps walking. ... I stare at the weapon in my hand. Never in my life did I expect to hold a gun, let alone fire one. It feels dangerous to me as if just by touching it, I could hurt someone (Roth's, 47). ...

As I said this morning,|| says Four, —next you will learn how to fight. The purpose of this is to prepare you to act.; to prepare your body to respond to threats and challenges – which you will need if you intend to survive life as a Dauntless (Roth's, 50).
